SPECIAL OLYMPICS PA TO HOLD CENTRAL BOWLING SECTIONAL AT ABC NORTH, ABC EAST & ABC WEST LANES IN HARRISBURG & MECHANICSBURG, PA, JAN. 19TH

SEVERAL VOLUNTEER POSITIONS STILL NEED TO BE FILLED

(Norristown, PA) January 8, 2020 - Special Olympics Pennsylvania (SOPA) will host the 2020 Central Bowling Sectional on Sunday, January 19th. Approximately 320 athletes, 100 coaches and more than 200 volunteers will participate in the sectional that includes competition in singles, doubles, traditional team, and Unified Sports® team and doubles. ABC North and ABC East Lanes in Harrisburg, PA as well as ABC West Lanes in Mechanicsburg, PA will serve as the venues for competition.

Opening Ceremonies will be held at each respective bowling house and include entertainment and guest appearances. Ceremonies will begin at staggered start times: 11:30 a.m. at ABC North, 12:00 p.m. at ABC East, and 12:30 p.m. at ABC West. Competition will commence 30 minutes after Opening ends and the sectionals will conclude between 4 and 5 p.m. Click here to find a tentative schedule of events.

The Sectional will serve as a qualifier for the 2nd Annual Indoor Winter Games to be held in York, PA from March 7 – 8, 2020. Each bowling sectional (Western, Central and Eastern) will host athletes that will compete in singles, Unified Doubles, Traditional Doubles, Traditional 4-person teams and Unified 4-person teams. In addition, each sectional will draw alternates for singles, Unified Doubles, Traditional Doubles, Unified Teams, and Traditional Teams. The 2020 Indoor Winter Games Bowling drawing will be held on Tuesday, January 21st.

These events require volunteers to serve as officials, athlete escorts, award presenters, and in various other ways. Those interested can register online at www.specialolympicspa.org. Spectators are also welcome to visit any of the competition venues and cheer on the athletes; no spectators may enter the bowling circle.
