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Special Olympics Pennsylvania's 2020 MedFest to Provide Free Sports Medical Screenings to Individuals with Intellectual Disabilities

(Norristown PA, March 3, 2020) – People with intellectual disabilities (ID) are routinely denied access to quality health care and are often put at an increased risk of suffering from chronic pain and disease, blindness, hearing loss and more. In response to these health challenges, Special Olympics Pennsylvania (SOPA) will host MedFest 2020 on Saturday, April 18th from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Geisinger Commonwealth School of Medicine, located at 525 Pine St. in Scranton, PA.

MedFest 2020, which is open to any individual with ID, cognitive delay or developmental disability, will offer **free** sports medical screenings including blood pressure, temperature, pulse, height, weight, body mass index, vision, medical history, potential medication side effects, and general physical health. Additionally, participants will be able to connect with providers within the Geisinger healthcare system to meet their identified follow-up care needs.

"Special Olympics is the world's largest public health organization for individuals with intellectual disabilities," said Chelsea Hammell, SOPA's Director of Program Initiatives. "Our free screenings, health education and prevention programs as well as fitness programs help to fill our athlete's critical need for health care. We want to ensure that our athletes are not only able to train and compete, but are also making healthy choices daily. We are proud to have screened over 3,000 athletes and impacted countless lives."

The event, sponsored by Geisinger Commonwealth School of Medicine, will feature fun activities such as a story-telling coloring station, an interactive snack table, DIY stress balls and more. Participants will also receive a gift bag upon departure and be given the opportunity to receive an application for participation and learn about Special Olympics Pennsylvania, which provides year-round training in 21 Olympic-type sports to more than 20,000 children and adults with ID through 54 local programs while also offering leadership opportunities and <u>health programming</u> designed to improve the lives of all athletes.
