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SPECIAL OLYMPICS PENNSYLVANIA'S 2020 WESTERN BOWLING SECTIONAL HAS BEEN CANCELLED DUE TO IMPENDING INCLEMENT WEATHER

(Norristown, PA) January 16, 2020 - The 2020 Western Bowling Sectional scheduled for Saturday, January 18, 2020 has been cancelled due to an inclement weather advisory calling for snow and ice. We regret to inform the public that the event will no longer take place; however, the safety of our athletes and volunteers is our primary concern.

The 2020 Western Bowling Sectional competitions were to serve as qualifying events for athletes who expressed an interest in competing at the 2nd annual 2020 Indoor Winter Games in York, PA from March 7th – 8th.

Athletes will still have a chance to qualify for the Indoor Winter Games through a random selection. The bowling drawing will be held on Friday, January 17th, and athletes will be notified soon thereafter.

More than 300 athletes, 100 coaches and 200 volunteers were scheduled to participate during the Games. The event was scheduled to take place at the Eastway and Greengarden Lanes in Erie, PA, as well as Westway Lanes in Girard, PA.
